

Bay Area Map





Most students live in **Berkeley** city, followed by **Oakland**, **Albany**, **San Francisco**, **Emeryville**, and the others






Commute to campus

Most students **walk** to campus. Some take public transport like **bus***, **BART****. Others also use personal transport like **bike**, and **car**


* Buses like AC Transit and Campus Shuttle are free for UC Berkeley students ** Bay Area Rapid Transit - Transit Line





Most students live "off campus"


- Most students live "off-campus" (not in university housing)

Most students have their own private bedroom


Most students have their **own private bedroom** in a shared house/apartment.

Most housing has 1-4 bedrooms


Most students live in housing that has **1-4 bedrooms**, and also **Studio** apartments

Most housing has 1-3 bathrooms, most likely to be shared






Shared housing

It's common for students to share housing with others


Most students **share** the housing with 1-3 people

Berkeley **graduate students**(from MIMS and other programs)






Rent

All students **rent** the housing they currently live in, and around 20% of them benefit from Berkeley rent control. Most of them either don't know if their housing comes under rent control, or their housing is **not on rent control*.**

*Rent control is a broad term for legislation that limits rental rates in a city or state. Rent control laws vary by municipality, but they generally put a limit on annual rent increases and protect tenants from eviction without cause.





Rent


A student's typical share of rent in the house/apartment per month is in the **\$1000-\$2000** range

Trends for high share of rent:

- Lives in studio apartment or alone in 1bed/1ba
- Has largest private bedroom in a shared house/apartment

Trends for low share of rent:


- Lives farther away from campus, in smaller spaces
- Has shared bedroom/space
- Lives with partner and doesn't have to pay equal share (sometimes, \$0)
- Lives in old and/or rent-controlled buildings
- Utilities are taken care of by the owner





Resources/where/how did you find your apartment?

Most students found their current housing through Craigslist,
Friends/Colleagues, Zillow,
Facebook and other housing pages. These are just a few common ways, there are many more.

"It's near to the bus station but can also walk to campus (10 min)."

messy/require maintenance (This is a co-op)" "It's a bit expensive"

"It's in South Berkeley, so a bit far from the college.

TIPS/ADVICE

"If you can visit your place beforehand, do so."

"It's good to start searching early, but sometimes it's just luck...: P Just to say, don't panic!"

"Start reaching out to places early (~May) rather than later on. You'll have more choices for leases that start in August. Also, try to plan a visit to see campus + see apartments - pictures don't always tell the full story!" "please see the apartment physically before renting. there's so much which you can understand from photos or even a video call. there are units always available, so come to berkeley, find a temporary stay for 2 weeks and look for a house."

"look early"

"Do an in-person tour first if possible, Start looking early"

"You'll never find the perfect place and will definitely have to make trade-offs. Make sure you know the things you can't give up on and give them priority.

Albany is a quiet and safe place to live. The rent is much lower than housing near the campus."

"Put in applications ASAP"

"Start search early. Always prefer a place near campus - it has so many advantages. Keep searching - sometime the search can be very long."

"Start early!"

"If it's in person being close to campus is helpful for socializing!"



TIPS/ADVICE

"Start early and reach out for help; don't restrict yourself to housing close to campus (Alameda County buses are frequent and free)"

"Be patient - there isn't a scarcity on housing so you don't need to sign the first place you find! And be communicative

- I had a lot of help from Tina and alumni on where to look!"

"I wish I had checked the crime rates of my area - I originally lived in an unsafe neighborhood and had to move again shortly after arriving at berkeley"

"Don't freak out too much if you can't find many listings for August move-in dates until June or July -- that's just how the timeline works for a lot of housing in the Berkeley area." "It's hard to feel out the neighborhood when looking for housing virtually. Research the neighborhood before committing."

"Don't fret if you don't find something early.
only start about a month out, takes a lot of time to find an
apartment so plan for that"

"There are lots of housing options but they go fast. There isn't a point to starting early, just know that when you do start it'll be intense. Also, if you can move a month early or so you will beat the rush of students all looking for housing."

"If they don't have to live with a partner or family member, they should strongly consider living with other I School or Cal Grad Students."

"UVA is a great place to live if you qualify"



TIPS/ADVICE

"I'd ask them to check out housing options such as the IHouse, or co-ops (Cloyne, African Co-op, Clark Kerr etc). Sure the price can be higher than renting your own place, but food will be taken care of, you'll have a great community to share the journey with, and there's always the convenience factor of being close to the campus."

"To be competitive, my roommate had to look for housing early and agree to move in early" "Look at Craigslist, go see the apartment for yourself, that's what my partner did." "Emeryville is a great place to live! It's quite and very safe."

"Ask outgoing students/current students for leads."

"A lot of apartments/landlords expect immediate move-in or maximum a few weeks from signing to start date. I had to negotiate with my landlord to sign my lease almost a month before the start date. You might not have luck shopping until close to your move-in."

"try to work w your landlord about move in and don't be afraid to use facebook to find furniture"

"start early"
